

A WINDOW INTO WHAT IS BELOW SHREWSBURY

The stairwell of the Shrewsbury Library displays an extraordinary photograph of the bedrock four miles below it, as if some giant had sliced through Cuttingsville like a loaf of bread. The image, created from many smaller photos of the rock types below Shrewsbury, features a dramatic conduit of magma that once erupted where Granite Hill is now. The Green Mountains may be placid now, but that hasn't always been the case. The recent earthquake centered in New Jersey and felt here in Vermont cautions us not to take the substrata for granted.

The artwork was created by Jonathon Wells, who grew up wandering the hills surrounding Shrewsbury. Trained as a geologist and a fine arts photographer, he has created scientifically accurate pictures of the geological formations below major cities such as Boston, New York and San Francisco, arresting images showing the buildings above and the layers of rock below. "I seek to make pieces that can help viewers understand how valuable



depicted in the survey. Mark Hamilton flew him along the transect of the cross-section so he could photograph the view looking north. including Shrewsbury Mountain, Killington, and Pico. Then he compiled all the photographs into one image, showing Shrewsbury and all its glorious rock below.

Jonathon, whose main livelihood is groundwater and environmental consulting, was working 4 miles from the Tewksbury, NJ epicenter of the earthquake on April 5, 2024. He was already intimately familiar with the Newark Basin, having created an image of it as part of his Location Series portfolio viewable on his www.earth-exposure.com portfolio website. "The earthquake most likely was the reactivation of a former fault along the western edge of the basin," he said. "It was a reminder that seismic activity can occur even in relatively stable areas."

Jonathon is in demand as a hydrogeologist, consulting on groundwater management and environmental remediation. For the last five years he hasn't had much time for his creative passion. That

groundwater is as a natural resource," he said in an interview. is changing, and he has begun working on a piece focusing on "How it flows, how vulnerable it is to effects of human land use."

When Shrewsbury resident Nancy Spencer suggested he do a similar treatment for his hometown, he was intrigued. Jonathon spent the next nine years preparing the artwork, which included recon flights over Cuttingsville with local pilot Mark Hamilton, wandering over Granite Hill, and corresponding with geologists working on the Vermont Geological Survey. "As a child I questioned what made the Green Mountains," he said. "Years later, I returned in search of the answers, hoping to share them with others."



May 1, 2024: ;Minutes of Selectboard Meeting

The meeting was convened at 6:35 PM

Agenda: Motion made by A. Korzun to follow the agenda. M. Cimonetti seconded. All in favor, motion approved.

Work in ROW Permit – Russellville Road: Resurfacing driveway and installing mailbox and posts. Moving mailbox further away from the road (At least 4 feet from road edge). The Road Commissioner approves. A. Korzun made a motion to approve the work in ROW with the Commissioner's comments. F Wyatt Seconded. All in favor, motion approved.

Mary Smith would like for there to be a list of major road projects that townspeople can view. Perhaps put it on the Town website. The Selectboard explained that the timing of the projects is often dictated by when grants are available.

Mary would also like to have a clearer understanding of the accounting of reserve funds in the next Town Report.

Mary wonders if GMP has any projects proposed in Shrewsbury. The Selectboard doesn't have knowledge of any currently proposed projects.

The CCC road is likely going to be closed for the majority of this year for construction by the State. The State is planning on replacing a bridge while the road is closed.

Paul Stewart would like for the Shunpike Road to be widened. He feels it is unsafe with the increased traffic.

Review Minutes: A. Korzun made a motion to accept the 4/17/2024 Selectboard meeting minutes. Seconded by M. Cimonetti. Approved.

Community Values Mapping Event!

Over 40 townspeople from all over Shrewsbury came to the Community Meeting House on April 27 to mark their favorite and important places on the map of Shrewsbury. Participants, who were grouped at tables of six to eight persons, took turns identifing their place of value on the maps using color markers according to whether it was a historic place, a working landscape, a community place, a recreational area, a place of commercial/economic value, a natural area, or a special scenic place. Land locations that people recognized as especially vulnerable were also marked. The Planning Commission held this event to gather the community's input on where the geographical places in town are that are most important to us and why. This information gathering method has been helpful to many other Vermont towns in developing town plans, educational events, and other town needs. Our map markups, when digitized, will allow us to visualize where our community's most valued places are and will allow us to compare them with regional ecological priorities.

## **Conserving Vermont: Public Meeting, June 27**

The Vermont Housing and Conservation Board (VHCB) will hold a virtual public meeting on June 27 from 4 to 7 pm on the "Vermont Conservation Strategy Initiative" (VCSI). This is a statewide planning process on how to achieve the goals set by Act 59 in 2023 for conserving 30% of Vermont by 2030 and 50% by 2050.

Through a contract with the non-profit Nature for Justice, VHCB has conducted an inventory of existing conservation programs and sought public input through surveys and focus groups on issues and ideas related to expanding permanent conservation of Vermont's forests, farmland, and watersheds and protecting ecologically significant areas, biodiversity, and sustainable natural resource management.

To learn more, visit https//vhcb.org, and under "Our Programs" select VCSI. There you can click on "Upcoming Events" to register for the June 27 public meeting. On the "Working Groups" tab, you can view the proceedings and reports of the four Working Groups that developed materials for the inventory phase of Act 59.

By attending the June 27 meeting, you can see and hear a presentation of the draft Conservation Inventory which will provide the basis for developing a Conservation Plan that's to be submitted to the Legislature by the end of 2025. You will also have a chance to ask questions and to offer your suggestions. Don't miss this opportunity to learn about and to affect the future of land conservation in Vermont.

## SHREWSBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

Fortunately, our Shrewsbury springtime has been wet enough to avoid the annual surge of wildfires. Frequent rains and dampness have kept the wildlands relatively wet. Also, the SVFD extends its thanks to Shrewsbury residents for being extra careful with burning and calling for permits before burning takes place. So, as of this writing, the SVFD has had no calls since April 8 when the department responded to a structure fire in Mt. Holly.

Although our department is named the Shrewsbury Volunteer Fire Department, fighting fires is not our only assignment. We also respond to vehicle crashes, carbon monoxide emergencies, and power lines down. In addition, we assist with calls for aid from the regional ambulance and many other emergencies. With summer coming, there will be an influx of Long Trail and Appalachian Trail hikers coming through town, and the department stands ready to do trail rescues. The SVFD is very fortunate to have a trail expert, Barry Griffith, who does an annual review of the trails that are located in our town. This has always been an interesting and informative training session that prepares our members to assist in rescues of injured or lost hikers. These have involved everything from bruises, to sprains, to broken bones, and even one heart attack several years ago. Barry has informed us that our trails are hiked by around 10,000 hikers per year, and the department stands ready to respond if any emergencies occur on the trails.

And, with summer, also comes Memorial Day. This is when we honor all who have served our country and our fire department. As you pass by the local cemeteries, you may notice red flags on some of the graves. This is the way we honor the time, effort, and skills in serving our town and neighbors by those members who have passed away. The flags bear an emblem of the fire service, a Maltese cross, and the words "Loyal to duty". It is a tribute to all those who have gone before us and helped the SVFD in any way.

The SVFD wishes everyone, both residents and visitors to our town, a safe an enjoyable summer season. Please be careful with all fires, grilling, vehicles and hiking. Always remember to **STAY FIRE SAFE!**



## June, a perfect month to marry

While Vermont is truly so beautiful in May with everything greening up, and roads and brooks and lakes devoid of litter, the month of June is perfect for marriages. However, back in time, one couple was never to find that happiness.

In Dawn D. Hance's book, "Shrewsbury Vermont - Our Town Was" there is a story about one of the tall tombstones in Laurel Glen Cemetery opposite the John Bowman mansion that is very sad to read. It tells the story of Adelaide "Taddie" Foster and Marshall P. Spafford. The couple were to be married, but Taddie passed away from complications of consumption (tuberculosis) in Poughkeepsie, NY. in 1877.

Spafford had erected a magnificent polished granite stone about 12 feet tall and topped by a cloth draped urn. He never married and is buried beside her in a grave marked by a plain granite stone inscribed "Marshall P. Spafford, October 14, 1840 - October 24, 1904."

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



# Juanita Burch-Clay on Asian Jumping Worms

## Wednesday, June 12 at 7:00pm at the Shrewsbury Library

Jumping worms? Snake worms? Crazy worms? These invasive worms, which go by many names, have spread surprisingly fast in Vermont in recent years. Find out what they are and why they are a threat to our forests. Find out what they

can do to your own garden and landscaping. Find out how to identify them and manage them.

Juanita Burch Clay is a retired educator, having ended her career running a farm and forest program for at-risk youth. She is currently a part-time ski instructor, town auditor, and UVM Extension Master Gardener, as well as a Vermont Coverts Cooperator. As a gardener, she is torn between the urge to expand her garden



and a desire to keep things simple! Her strong interest in invasive worms grew from discovering them in her own garden, brought in with a load of composted cow manure a few years ago. Her goal is to learn as much as she can about managing jumping worms and then share that knowledge with others. The information she will provide is based on research from UVM's Dr. Josef Gorres and other experts who are working to understand and control this environmental threat.





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

## Available Items:


