


LARRY CARRARA AL RIDLON, SR. B. J. STEWART

The Selectboard meets the 1st and 3rd Wednesday at 7pm at the Town Office.

July 3, 2024: Minutes of Selectboard Meeting

Present at meeting: Selectboard members: Aaron Korzun, Marc Cimonetti, Francis Wyatt. Town Clerk: Rebecca Rice. Road Jamie Carrara says we need to get other Town road crew members to Commissioner: Jamie Carrara. Interim Administrative Assistant: Laura Black. Contract Assessor: Lisa Wright. Listers: Clara Krueger, Scott Ryan.

Members of the public: Tim Rice (Wilk Paving). Mary Smith. The meeting was convened at 6:33 PM.

addition of a work in right of way permit on Russelville Rd. F. Wyatt seconded. All in favor, motion approved.

Paving Bids: Three paving bids for Cold River Rd and Mount Holly Adjourned at 8:25 PM Rd: Fuller Sand and Gravel \$287,540.85, Pike Industries \$284,788.08, Wilk Paving \$268,897.50. A. Korzun made a motion to approve the bid These minutes are unofficial until approved by the Selectboard at the from Wilk Paving. M. Cimonetti seconded. Approved.

Re-appraisal Contract: The Listers and Contract Assessor have reviewed the re-appraisal bid from Tyler Technologies and are recommending that we select their bid. They recommend changing the effective date to April 2027 instead of April 2026, which might increase the bid amount by 3%, due to inflation. They also recommend converting to Catalis AssessPro 5.0 assessment inventory software. The Tyler Technologies bid assumes conversion to AssessPro 5.0. A. Korzun made a motion to approve the bid from Tyler Technologies for \$86,800 for townwide reappraisal. M. Cimonetti seconded. Approved. A. Korzun made a motion to approve the bid from Catalis Tax and CAMA for the conversion to AssessPro 5.0 for initial cost of \$7,500 and an annual fee of \$5,947, with clarification of when the annual fee is due. M. Cimonetti seconded. Approved.

Lisa Wright reported on the education tax rate. Shrewsbury's tax rate will be increasing by \$0.095 for residential and \$0.175 for nonresidential.

IT Consulting and Hybrid Meeting Equipment Report: Nothing new to report on the equipment for hybrid meetings. A. Korzun and Laura Black attended a session on the new open meeting law at the RRPC. We are meeting the minimum requirements of the open meeting law while we look into moving to a hybrid meeting format. Laura Black will contact JEG Designs to attend our next meeting, if possible, to discuss IT.

FEMA Reporting: All of Shrewsbury's flood repair projects but one are obligated. The one project is not obligated due to possible mitigation projects associated with it. Not having this one project obligated is holding up us receiving the money for the other projects. Jamie Carrara and Marc Cimonetti are recommending that we not pursue the mitigation funding so that we can get the last project obligated and receive all of the funds.

Pre-qualifying for Hazard Mitigation Funds: Laura Black and Nancy Bell are assisting the Selectboard and Road Commissioner with the preapplication for the hazard mitigation funds. Many projects are being looked at.

Right of Way Permit: A. Korzun made a motion to approve the work in right of way permit on Russellville Rd., with the Road Commissioner's comments. M. Cimonetti seconded. Approved.

New Business/Open to the Public: Mary Smith inquired about acquiring the 4-acre property on Lincoln Hill Road across from the Aframe. It has an easement by the Vermont Land Trust. We suggested

that she approach the Development Review Board and the Vermont Land Trust.

get Class A CDL permits. Right now Jamie is the only one with a Class A CDL. We agreed to pay for the two other road crew members to get a Class A CDL.

Review Minutes: A. Korzun made a motion to accept the 6/19/2024 Selectboard meeting minutes. Seconded by F. Wyatt. Approved.

Agenda: Motion made by A. Korzun to follow the agenda with the Review Orders: F. Wyatt made a motion to approve Selectboard Orders #7 for \$1,667.73 and Road Orders #7 for \$4,990.12. Seconded by M. Cimonetti. Approved.

Review Orders: F. Wyatt made a motion to approve Selectboard and Michael (Christine) Basilicato Orders #7a for \$255,008.06 (\$246,094.81 for flood damage repair leaves behind 11 grandchildren ar repayment) and Road Orders #7a for \$98,834.91 (\$79,454 for F600 nieces, nephews and many cousins. 

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SHREWSBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

What a beautiful time of year! We are right in the middle of summer and have been fortunate that the weather hasn't given us many problems locally. There have been plenty of weatherrelated issues elsewhere recently.

This past month the SVFD responded to a motor vehicle accident on Route 103. There were two requests from Regional Ambulance for assistance, the first on Route 103 and another on Tabor Rd.

During the past month we practiced pump operations at two different water sites, driver training, and tanker shuttle. Chief Phillip Severy organized an initial attack drill at the mountain school. At this drill, we assess a theoretical fire scene. We discuss what equipment is needed and where to safely locate the equipment. We deploy a porta tank, which is basically a small pool that holds 2000 gallons of water which connects to the pumper, and then the hoses are pulled to attack the theoretical fire. We discuss the fireground operations and communications.

If you are doing yard cleanup this time of year and need to burn brush, always call Fire Warden Kevin Brown (802-345-8668) or Assistant Fire warden Al Ridlon Jr (802-282-3642) for a burn permit and REMEMBER

How is it that I'm already writing for the August Times??? Where is the time going . . . ?

Speaking of time and its passage, maybe you want to consider joining Green Mountain Neighbors before you actually need it for transportation or help getting a project done around the house. As with many things, waiting could mean it's too late, or at best inconvenient. Think about needing an emergency medical procedure, or you are working on a project and injure yourself. These things can happen at any time, not just when we're elderly. Also, as a member you can expand your social circle through member-based events – both purely for fun, and educational – and transportation to those events by volunteers.

On Wednesday, July 17, Linda Fontana and I met with seven of our neighbors at the Shrewsbury Library to talk about GMN and what it provides. There were lots of great questions and concerns raised. In the end, three people signed up to become members, one more said he would complete the enrollment from home, and we added three new volunteers.

We plan to hold another drop-in session toward the end of the summer (there's that time thing again). And you can always contact one of us personally and we can arrange to meet.

Green Mountain Neighbors isn't just about services, though that's a very important aspect. We also sponsor events. Already we've had two sessions with Master Gardener Jim Corven, sharing his expertise and answering a wide array of questions. We're planning a series of walks in each of our towns to share our local knowledge with residents of the other towns. These will be fun ways to get to know other GMN members outside our borders.

Remember, we do not want to discourage anyone from becoming a member. GMN has a small pool of dollars to subsidize a fee waiver and we recently applied for a grant to create a little larger pool of dollars. Don't be afraid to ask. We are here to help you not to put a greater burden on you. By the way, no fee is required to be a volunteer! And we need both members and volunteers to make this work.

Green Mountain Neighbors has access to a whole lot of basic home-care equipment. If you need any of this sort of thing it's worth asking. You might be able to save yourself some money by borrowing rather than purchasing. Some items include:

- A wide assortment crutches & canes

### Israel/Palestine Talk

Over the past months, I had been feeling despair listening to the news coming out of Israel/Palestine. First, the horrors of October 7. Then, the horrors of the war in Gaza. I was feeling deep disappointment with a country where I have strong personal ties. I thought, if we, as Jews, after 2000 years of living as an oppressed people, culminating in mass genocide, can't do better than this, then what hope is there for humankind?

So, I decided to go to Israel. Of course, to visit friends and relatives, to go swimming in the Mediterranean and the Jordan River, to eat Felafel and Halwah straight from the Shuk in Jerusalem. But mostly for a one-week Study Tour with New Israel Fund.

The New Israel Fund supports initiatives for peace, coexistence, and social justice. Our tour included, among other things, visits to East Jerusalem, the West Bank, Bedouin Villages, and Nazareth. We had a chance to hear from Palestinian and Jewish activists, people who lost their parents on October 7, physicians who have worked in Gaza, soldiers who have served in the Occupied Territories, even an unfortunate encounter with West Bank Settlers.

In my talk on September 20, I will try to give a quick history of the Arab and Jewish experience over the past 2000 years, an explanation of the logistics of Israeli politics, and a description of a vision for a better future for all. ~Becki Bates



A young bear in full flight being chased by a coyote was a surprise trail cam capture! I would love to know what incident led to this chase! Was the bear too close to the coyote's den, pups or kill? Would a larger, more mature bear also have run from a coyote?





Along well traveled routes used by bears are trees with claw and bite marks. Several individual bears, male and female, will leave their scent and markings on these scent posts. Even cubs will mark. Look for small bite marks at the bottom of a tree or pole!



One of my trail camera goals has been to find a tree/pole with bear sign and get pictures and videos of the bear's routine as they do this. It's a comical procedure as the bear rubs it's back up and down, while reaching up above its head to leave claw marks and turning its head side to side, leaving bite marks! I found the perfect location and my kind neighbors, Jo and

A barn swallow family made their nest at the top of the new building on our farm, and last week the four babies were so big, they were overcrowding the nest and falling out regularly. Knowing absolutely nothing about birds, I was nervous they were seriously injured or at least at risk of being stepped on or driven over in such a high traffic area. Thank goodness for VINS (Vermont Institute of Natural Science), because I was able to call them and chat about how to care for the situation.

VINS taught us that since the babies weren't flying yet, they had us carefully return the babies to the nest every time we found one on the ground, so they could continue to be fed. We also put a soft, puffy dog bed below the nest to cushion their repeat falls. One baby didn't end up making it, which felt incredibly sad, but after several trips up and down a tall extension ladder, the others eventually flew away.

What's New at Jockey Hill Farm

While we've had to reschedule walks at Jockey Hill Farm over the last two months, we're hoping to schedule a couple in September and October. In the meantime, we've been busy with numerous projects to continue our forest stewardship efforts. Most challenging is coping with the impacts of climate change on our land. Our primary stream, Gould Brook, that runs along Coldham Road, and its tributaries have suffered from significant flooding and erosion including the loss of 25 feet on both sides of Gould Brook as it enters the field just below our farm. We have installed two over-sized culverts in areas where we can no longer ford tributaries and are considering a small bridge in another area. We're working with the State to consider the best options for each location. Another climate change impact has been the high winds that have split mostly pines, maples and ash about 15 to 20 feet off the ground. While we have always had blowdowns, the frequency today is far greater than in the past. In addition to losing magnificent trees, we now confront the risk of more "widow-makers" throughout our forest requiring constant vigilance as we walk through our woods.

We recently secured a grant from USDA's Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) to eradicate the seven invasive plant species that are thriving at the farm, particularly in patch cuts (harvested areas of roughly one acre) where invasives are competing with the regeneration of saplings. Redstart Consulting, our consulting forester, will begin this work soon. We've been mostly spared the impact of invasive insects that have been identified in other parts of the State but are slowly moving to our area such as the emerald ash borer and hemlock wooly adelgid. An excellent new State website for tracking invasive insects is the "Vermont Forest Invasive Pest Status Map".


We continue to implement recommendations from Audubon Vermont to enhance bird habitat at the farm resulting from its "Bird Habitat Assessment" conducted back in May 2023. Starting in 2023, we've shifted to mowing most of our fields in September every three years instead of annually. We also plan to grow robust buffer zones of vegetation between the fields and the forest to attract birds that flourish in the understory and midstory. As of April, our bird inventory included 73 species and in May, thanks to Linda Shelvey and the Shrewsbury Conservation Commission, we've added the Northern Waterthrush, Rose Breasted Grosbeak, the Northern Cardinal and the Eastern Bluebird.


In a subsequent article, I'll provide updates of our efforts on forest carbon which have evolved considerably since I first presented on this topic at the library in February 2020 and on our planting of climate resilient trees including our hybrid Chinese/American chestnuts. I'll leave you here with a note about three new Leopold Benches that we have now been placed around the farm named after the famous environmentalist, Aldo Leopold, author of A Sand County Almanac. The benches are placed in Alison's Meadow, by Nan's Pond and in Tim's Meadow as noted on the map available in the kiosk by our bridge at 630 Coldham Road. Please come and enjoy them. In addition, below are two links to my presentation called "The Resilience and Benefits of Our Forests in A Changing Climate" I presented at the Shrewsbury Library on May 10 and a two-minute video called "Jockey Hill Farm from Above" featuring three years of drone photography

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
